
- Pebble painting

Pebble Painting

Step 1

Pick a design you wish to do...

← Here are some examples.

Step 2

Pick a medium (acrylic paints, nail varnish, old wall paint, felt tips, etc.)

Step 3

Complete your design and allow to dry.







Cereal Box Puppet Theatre

South West Yorkshire Partnership

You'll need to make the puppets too!

Step 1

On one side of the cereal box, cut a hole big enough for a puppet to get through

Step 2

On the *front* of the box, cut a hole big enough for the screen of the theatre.

Step 3

Decorate the box (I used wrapping paper, but you can use whatever you have to hand).

Monster Box

Step 1

You'll need an empty tissue box. Wrap it in decorative paper or paint/colour the box.

Step 2

Give it eyes, wonky sharp teeth, scars and stitches.

Step 3

Make the teeth look like they're rotting with bits of food stuck in them.







Stencil Painting

A simple way to make stencils

Step 1

Cut out shapes, initials and any other images you want, ideally on a piece of card.

Step 2

On a new sheet (paper or card) lay your cut stencil on top. Dab a sponge in paint and then dab the sponge over your stencil, filling the cur shape. Be careful not to use too much paint.

Step 3

Carefully lift the stencil away from your bottom sheet of paper or card and allow the images to dry.













Felt Pictures

You can keep it simple like our example, or really make it detailed and intricate.

Step 1


You'll need blue, yellow and green felt for our example on the next slide.

Step 2

Cut our blue felt for the background of the picture, a yellow sun shape and a green palm tree shape.







Step 3

Stick the background piece of felt onto cardboard using a glue stick or similar.

Step 4

Stick the foreground images (sun, palm) on to the felt background.

Step 5

You can then embellish with things like sand (glue with PVA or similar) or add a yellow strip of felt for sand.









Lollipop Flowers

Step 1

Stick the top of a lollipop stick to the middle of a bun case.

Step 2

Decorate the middle of the bun case with yellow buttons, or similar (you could use your finger dipped in yellow paint to print).

Step 3

Paint or colour in the outer bun case and, when dry, snip the case to create "petals".
